Introduction

Physical Therapy is a health care profession that primarily focuses on the preservation, development, and restoration of optimal function. Physical therapists provide evaluative, rehabilitative, and preventive health care services designed to alleviate pain; prevent the onset and progression of impairment, functional limitation, disability resulting from injury, disease, or other causes; and restore, maintain and promote overall fitness, health and optimal quality of life. Physical therapists work with individuals of all ages who demonstrate movement dysfunction, or the potential for such dysfunction, of the neurological, musculoskeletal, sensorimotor, and cardiopulmonary systems.

Physical therapists practice in a hospital setting, or provide services in out-of-hospital settings through home health agencies, in nursing homes, in industrial settings, through public health agencies, in private physical therapy clinics, in public schools and in a variety of other nontraditional settings.

Mission

The mission of the Doctor of Physical Therapy Program at Gannon University is to graduate knowledgeable, service-oriented, self-assured, adaptable, reflective practitioners who, by virtue of critical and integrative thinking, commitment to lifelong learning, and ethical values, render independent judgments concerning patient/client needs that are supported by evidence. Graduates possess the intellectual capacity and psychomotor proficiency to meet the current and future needs of the profession and health care system through the provision of culturally sensitive patient/client-centered care for the diagnosis of, intervention for, and prevention of impairments, functional limitations, and disabilities related to movement, function, and health.

Curriculum

The Gannon University DPT program is a 32 month program. Building on the study of normal structure and function, the problem-oriented curriculum presents the clinical art and science of physical therapy in an integrated manner organized around body systems. Practical clinical experiences are integrated into the academic program at the completion of major areas of study on a nontraditional schedule. The academic clinical coordinator assigns students, based on student learning needs, to clinical sites. In addition to sites located in the Erie and western Pennsylvania areas, the program offers clinical experiences at sites throughout the United States and Canada. Students must be prepared to go out of the Western Pennsylvania area for at least three of the four clinical experiences.

Accreditation

The physical therapy educational program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education of the American Physical Therapy Association.

Strengths

Only a small percentage of physical therapists in the American Physical Therapy Association are board-certified clinical specialists. Gannon physical therapy instructors boast certified clinical specialization in orthopedics, neurology, pediatrics, and geriatrics.

The Physical Therapy program has over 200 clinical affiliations with physical therapy facilities in the country. This enables the student to have the opportunity to practice with a culturally diverse client population and learn various physical therapy approaches from experienced clinicians.

Gannon University's DPT problem-oriented curriculum is designed to allow immediate application of didactic material by integrating practical clinical experiences throughout the program. Clinical exposure starts with the first full-time clinical experience occurring after only two semesters of classroom work.

Since the program's inception, Gannon PT graduates have passed their state's licensure exam at a rate equal to or higher than the national average.

Graduate Assistantships

Gannon University has several graduate assistantships including positions for certified athletic trainers, anatomy assistants, and administrative assistants. **Graduate assistants receive a partial tuition waiver and a stipend.**

Admission Requirements

- ▶ Baccalaureate degree from an accredited college or university.
- ▶ Cumulative prerequisite course Quality Point Average (QPA) of 3.0 or better (4.0 scale). Grades of D not acceptable.
- ▶ Overall undergraduate QPA of 3.00 or better (4.0 scale).
- ▶ Demonstration of the ethical, personal and professional qualities to fulfill the role of the physical therapist as determined by review of the applicant's references and the interview process.
- ▶ TOEFL - Minimum score of 550 for all applicants from non-English speaking countries.
- ▶ The application review process begins on **November 1**. All applications must be postmarked by **January 15**. Applications postmarked after **January 15** will be processed on a space available basis.
- ▶ Meet Essential Functions.

Important Notes Regarding Prerequisites:

- ▶ The foregoing requirements cannot be waived.
- ▶ Prerequisites must be completed within the five years preceding entrance to the graduate program.
- ▶ Prerequisites must be completed by June 30 of year of expected start date.

Recommended Courses:

- ▶ Social Science - at least two additional semesters in social sciences (i.e., sociology, social psychology)
- ▶ Word Processing
- ▶ Kinesiology with lab

Communication:

Practice as a health care professional requires the ability to communicate both orally and in writing. The Physical Therapy program stresses communication and expects enrolled students to demonstrate graduate level competence in written as well as verbal communication.

Listed below are sample course descriptions for the prerequisites required for physical therapy.

Prerequisites must be completed within five years preceding entrance to the graduate program. Courses taken prior to that time need to be repeated for credit.

Human Anatomy (Gross Anatomy)

This course, along with Human Anatomy Lab, is designed for students in the Medical and/or Health Programs. The course takes a functional approach to the anatomy of all the systems of the human body. This is an **upper level course** requiring prerequisites in the biological sciences.

The physical therapy faculty recommend that Human Anatomy be taken within one year preceding entrance into the graduate program. The physical therapy faculty have an expectation that students entering the graduate program will have a working knowledge of human anatomy, particularly of the neuromusculoskeletal and cardiopulmonary systems, as the system courses taken during the graduate program are structured around the students having a strong foundation in anatomy.

Human Anatomy Lab

This lab course complements and enhances the Human Anatomy lecture course through the study of the human cadaver (either dissected or prosected parts). **Models and computer programs are accepted; however, a human cadaver is preferred.**

Human Physiology

This course is designed for students in the Medical and/or Health Programs, dealing primarily with the function (physiology) of the human body with special emphasis placed on the circulatory, endocrine, and nervous systems. This is an upper level course requiring prerequisites in biology and chemistry.

Human Physiology Lab

Statistics

An introduction to frequency distributions, sampling distributions, T-tests, analysis of correlation, and linear regression. Please note that the Admissions Committee does not recommend a Business Statistics course.

Psychology

Behavioral or social science courses at the 200 or 300 level meet this requirement.

Physiology of Exercise and Sport

An examination of the human physiological function as it relates to stresses created by various sport and other physical activities. Acute and chronic effects of various training programs are examined for their contribution to the improvement of performance in sport and physical activity.

Physics I and II

An introduction to mechanics, sound, fluids, electricity and magnetism, heat and optics with experimental verification of the fundamental laws of physics, an introduction to basic laboratory methods, including an introduction to error analysis. (2 semesters)

Physics Lab I and II

Biology (2 semesters)

These two semesters may be any prerequisite biology course taken in preparation for Human Anatomy and Human Physiology.

Chemistry (2 semesters)

These two semesters should include a review of basic theories and general principles of chemistry.

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Financial Facts and Policies for Graduate Students in Physical Therapy 2009-2010 Academic Year

Graduate Assistantships

Gannon University has several graduate assistantship positions for certified athletic trainers and for students interested in assisting with the laboratory courses in anatomy. Students receive a partial tuition waiver and stipend. Students must be pursuing a graduate degree in Physical Therapy at Gannon. The graduate assistantships provide a unique opportunity to earn a degree in Physical Therapy while gaining experience in athletic training or laboratory assistance.

Federal Stafford Student Loan (FSSL)

Full and part-time (6 credits or more) graduate students are eligible to apply for the student loan. Students must file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid as well as the loan application. The applications are available in the Financial Aid Office. Loan applications may be obtained from most lending institutions (banks, credit unions, etc.).

Students may be eligible to borrow up to \$8,500 per academic year, depending on the number of credits and financial need. Students must successfully complete 18 credits in order to apply for the next increment of \$8,500.

▶ **PLEASE NOTE:** Graduate students are not eligible for the PHEAA/PELL grant.

Unsubsidized Student Loan

Full- and part-time students (6 credits or more) can borrow up to \$12,000 per academic year. This is in addition to the \$8,500 available through the Federal Stafford Loan program. Unlike the Federal Stafford Loan, the interest on the Unsubsidized Student Loan starts the day this loan is disbursed. More information on this loan and the Federal Stafford loan is available in the Financial Aid Office or from private lenders.

Other Aid

The Financial Aid Office also acts as a resource center for other forms of financial aid. Listings of outside scholarships, sponsorships and loans are available. We also have listings of private sector part-time employment opportunities. These resources fluctuate and vary based on the time of year and the needs of the sponsors and employers. Please refer to the semester schedule or your tuition bill for the late fee policy. A late fee will be charged to all students, including those receiving employee reimbursement, regardless of when the first class is held, if payment is not made by the due date. Your bill must be returned to the Cashier's Office to finalize your enrollment and confirm your intention to attend, even if no payment is required or credit is due. This process lets Gannon know you will attend!

Deferred Payment Policy

- ▶ The maximum amount considered for deferment is \$2,500 (no less than \$100.00 may be deferred per semester).
- ▶ A down payment of 25% or more of the unpaid balance is due at the time of registration.
- ▶ A \$30.00 processing fee will be charged.
- ▶ Payments are due in three equal installments as follows:

FALL:	September 20	October 20	November 20
SPRING:	February 20	March 20	April 20
- ▶ Deferred payments may be arranged for Fall and Spring semesters only.
- ▶ Deferred payments may be arranged by using the form on the reverse side of the bill, or in person in the Cashier's Office or the Center for Adult Learning.

Academic Scholarships

Twenty academic scholarships will be awarded to the applicants with the highest grade point averages. Each scholarship is \$500 per semester for six of the eight semesters of the program. Students must earn a minimum grade point average of 3.30 in the DPT program to continue receiving the award. The scholarship is not awarded for the summer semesters.
